The Difference Between a Milkshake and a Frappe

Do you know the difference between a milkshake and a frappe? How about a cabinet? Read on to learn the New England frappe drink definition. When is a milkshake not a milkshake? In New England, of course, when it's a frappe (or a cabinet). Confused? Let's break down the delicious difference between a milkshake, frappe, and cabinet.

According to the *American Heritage College Dictionary*, a milkshake is a "a beverage that is made of milk, ice cream, and often flavoring and is blended or whipped until foamy." Unless you live in New England, where a milkshake would never include ice cream. Adding ice cream makes it a "frappe" drink.

I don't know why we call the delicious mix of ice cream, milk, syrup, and sometimes malt powder a frappe (pronounced "frap") here in New England, but when you really think about it, a milkshake shouldn't be anything *other* than shaken (NOT stirred) milk and syrup. And a frappe, which sounds funny and looks elegant with those double p's, must (of course) be the fancier of the two, meaning the one with the ice cream. It makes perfect sense. Now for those who wonder if a chocolate milkshake in New England is basically just a glass of chocolate milk, the answer is a resounding NO. Chocolate milk is the casual stirring of chocolate syrup into a glass of milk. A chocolate milkshake is the vigorous shaking (or blending) of the two until the consistency is perfectly creamy and a frothy head is formed. I used the same stick blender is a tall glass pitcher to make this drink as well. Finally, to make matters even more confusing, if you're from certain parts of Rhode Island and southeastern Massachusetts, you order a cabinet.

What is a cabinet? Basically it's the same thing as a frappe (usually coffee-flavored and made with Autocrat Coffee Syrup, but it got its name because that's where the blender was kept. We like to keep milkshake-loving tourists on their toes here in New England!

Zen Coloring Book For Adults

Or type Zen Coloring Book For Adults in your Windows 10 search box. It should bring up store results. The app is free, so just tap the Free button to install.

Preserve privacy with your Windows 10 PC. To turn off location tracking, go to start/setting and choose Privacy, In the Location area, you can have windows stop tracking you—or choose specific apps that can or cannot track you. To get rid of ads on the lock screen, start at settings, go to Personalization, click lock screen, and under Background, choose Picture or Sideshow—not Windows Spotlight, which lets ads through. To limit advertisers access to your data, go to Privacy/General and switch off "Let apps use my advertising ID.

Some Tricks to make your fruit and vegetables last longer

Put an apple in your bag of potatoes Sprouted potatoes are at the top of nobody's to-eat list. It turns out the best way to keep them fresh is to keep an apple in the bag – apples produce ethylene gas, which keeps potatoes fresher and firmer, and ready for mashed potato duties for a few more weeks

But keep apples away from other fruits and veggies Ethylene gas may be good for potatoes, but it's bad for almost everything else. Keep apples out of the fruit bowl (and in a plastic bag in the fridge) and you should suddenly find that your other purchases keep much better.

Wash berries in vinegar Because fate is cruel, berries are both a) pretty much the most expensive fruit and b) the quickest to go moldy by a mile. You can extend their life by giving them a bath in 1 cup of vinegar and 3 cups of water before you put them in the fridge – this kills the mold spores and bacteria that turn them fuzzy. Just be sure to dry them thoroughly before storing.

DON'T refrigerate your tomatoes Seriously. You'll kill their flavor, and their juicy texture doesn't survive so well in the cold either. To make the most of your tomatoes, keep them on a counter to allow them to ripen them to their full potential. FYI, other veggies that shouldn't live in the fridge include potatoes and onions, although they should be stored in a cool dark place rather than within the sun's reach.

Wrap celery in foil In the plastic wrapper you get from the supermarket, celery will last a week or two at most – annoying if you only use a couple of stalks at a time. Swap the original packaging for a sheet of aluminium foil – it lets the gas that spoils your celery escape, rather than trapping it like plastic, so the celery stays crisp long enough for plenty more hummus-dipping adventures.

Keep Mushrooms in a paper bag Proper greengrocers use these bad boys for a reason – paper bags keep mushrooms much more efficiently than the usual plastic tubs. Moisture is a slime sentence for mushrooms, so storing them this way keeps them clean and dry (and if you leave them too long and find they get too dry, you can give them a quick rinse in the sink and they'll plump right back up).

Ice your greens You're too good for limp lettuce and you know it. Rehydrate and refresh your leaves by separating them and tossing them into a sinkful of iced water for anywhere from 5 to 30 mins, depending on how sad they're looking. Voila – your dinner salad no longer earns itself a spot on Dimly Lit Meals for One.

Homemade Shower Cleaner and Soap Scum Remover

You'll need: a spray bottle,1 part Dawn dishwashing liquid,1 part white vinegar

Directions: Measure out equal amounts of Dawn soap and white vinegar. (Somewhere between one and two cups of each should be plenty.)

Heat the white vinegar in your microwave until hot, then pour it into your spray bottle.

Pour the Dawn soap into the bottle as well, then put the lid on and gently shake to mix.

How To Use Spray liberally around your tub and/or shower. Let the mixture sit for 30 minutes to an hour, then scrub (if needed) and rinse well.

When using, make sure your bathroom is as well-ventilated as possible. Turn on the fan and open any windows, because this stuff is POTENT. NEW CASTLE, NEW HAMPSHIRE

One of the loveliest New Hampshire coastal towns, this town of 968 residents at the mouth of the Piscataqua River is made up entirely of islands. The Victorian charm of the Wentworth by the Sea Hotel makes the setting even lovelier.

Unique View: Portsmouth Harbor Lighthouse

CAMDEN, MAINE

The self-dubbed "Jewel of the Coast" is a well-deserved moniker, and this Mid-Coast harbor town of 4,823 on Penobscot Bay is tucked where mountains reach down to the sea.

Unique View: Three windjammers making this narrow harbor their home.

NEWPORT, RHODE ISLAND

Spectacular at every turn, from broad, sandy beaches to deep harbors bristling with schooners, racing yachts, and pleasure craft; from cozy Colonial taverns to opulent Gilded Age mansions.

Unique View: The twinkling span of the Pell Bridge just after twilight.

NEW SHOREHAM, RHODE ISLAND

All of verdant, windswept Block Island, just 13 miles off Rhode Island's southern coast, is technically New Shoreham, but it's the Victorian harbor-front that makes landing here forever captivating.

Unique View: Granite-blocked Southeast Lighthouse, perched at on one of the island's iconic bluffs...

ROCKPORT, MASSACHUSETTS

Artists love Massachusetts coastal towns, and Rockport in particular. Painters turned this fishing village into an art colony for a reason—it's an inspiration. Perched at the tip of Cape Ann, there are rugged shorelines, hidden coves, and a bustling, historic village.

Unique View: Motif No. 1, the most painted building in the world.

STONINGTON BOROUGH, CONNECTICUT

Connecticut coastal towns don't always get the attention they so justly deserve. This delightful village of fewer than 1,000 residents boasts a wealth of 18th-19th-century buildings on its own narrow peninsula that juts into Fisher's Island Sound and Little Narragansett Bay, with views in all directions.

Unique View: From "The Point," a view of Rhode Island, Connecticut, and New York.

OAK BLUFFS, MARTHA'S VINEYARD, MASSACHUSETTS

The brightly colored gingerbread Victorian cottages make this laid-back enclave on Martha's Vineyard a true New England confection. And on one night each summer, the cottages lights up with Chinese lanterns, making it likely the loveliest place on earth.

Unique View: The nation's oldest platform carousel.

PROVINCETOWN, MASSACHUSETTS

Set at the outermost tip of Cape Cod, surrounded by water on three sides and backed by vast sand dunes on the fourth, Provincetown is a colorful gem that's drawn artists and writers for generations.

Unique View: A bird's eye, from the top of the Pilgrim Monument.
