#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

**Keep** <u>uncut</u> **lemons fresh** for weeks by putting them in a glass jar filling it with water and covering it tightly.

If You Use One Tea Bag You Will Never See Spiders Or Mice in your house Again! We all want to feel comfortable in our homes, but there are times when we can feel violated. I'm not talking about another person coming in, I'm talking about little critters, such as mice and spiders. If you have those unwelcome visitors, fixing it is as easy as using a bag of tea. The type of tea you would use is Peppermint. The method for making this work is easier than you could possibly imagine. Simply brew a cup of peppermint tea and then leave the bag in the room where spiders and mice have been a problem. You even get to enjoy the cup of tea! Put the tea bag in a corner, so it is best if you use 4 tea bags, one in each corner. If you aren't one to brew some tea, you can get the same results with essential oil. Put 10 – 15 drops of peppermint oil in a spray bottle full of water and spray it around the baseboards. Not only does it help to keep spiders and mice away, your home is going to smell fantastic! For spiders, you can also use cinnamon and lemon oil.

**Brain-training games do not improve memory.** The Federal Trade Commission determined that claims made by the website Lumosity that its games improve memory were not proved, and the FTC forced the company to refund \$2 million to subscribers. The FTC also won a judgment against Focus Education, which claimed its Jungle Rangers game could improve school performance. (Michelle Rusk, JD. **To get spots out of a microfiber couch,** try rubbing them gently with artists' gum, a powerful eraser found at art-supply stores. If you spill something on microfiber, immediately apply cornmeal or baking soda to the spill and leave it on for 15 minutes, then vacuum and repeat if necessary. To clean very dirty microfiber, check the item's tag. If it has a W on it, you can use water and soap for cleaning. If it has an S, water could stain the fabric-solvent is required. In that case, spray rubbing alcohol over soiled areas, then rub a rough sponge or old toothbrush the stains should come right off. This is to support their corporate charitable giving program to the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society as well other local charities through Ribfest.

#### McDonalds founders were from Manchester NH

The McDonald brothers vowed they would be financially independent when their father was fired from his job at a New Hampshire shoe factory after 42 years of loyal service when the shoe factory closed. Stung by their father's abrupt dismissal, Mac and Dick McDonald vowed they would be millionaires by the time they reached 50. They almost made it. Richard and Maurice McDonald were born in Manchester, N.H.

After they graduated from high school, the brothers moved to Hollywood CA Mac and Dick began working as set movers and handymen at Film studios. They opened a movie theatre that didn't do so well. They opened a hot dog stand in Monrovia CA in 1937. They called it the airdome. Ten cent hamburgers were added, along with all-you-can drink orange juice for a nickel. The hot dog stand did okay. In 1940, the brothers moved the building 40 miles east to a bigger city: San Bernardino. They called it McDonald's Bar-B-Que, with 25 items on the menu. By the fall of 1948, Dick and Mac realized most of their money was coming from hamburger sales. They closed their barbecue stand and built anew.

Their goals: speed, volume and cleanliness. The new drive-in had no interior and no wait staff, but it had a kitchen designed as a production assembly line. A stainless steel grill replaced the old iron version because it could cook more burgers. Paper and plastic replaced cutlery and plates. Customers ordered food at the counter and got it within seconds.

At the new restaurant, called McDonald's, they sold only hamburgers, cheeseburgers, potato chips, coffee, soft drinks and apple pie. They swapped out the apple pie and potato chips for milk shakes and French fries. They were so successful they <u>each bought a Cadillac</u> and traded it in every year. By 1952 the MacDonald brothers decided to expand. The first franchise was built in Phoenix, Ariz., in 1953 for Neil Fox. Fox's brother-in-law and friend bought the second franchise in Downey, Calif., where the oldest original McDonald's restaurant still stands. In 1954, they met Ray Kroc, who persuaded them to go national. By 1961 they were tired of the restaurant business. They sold out to Kroc for \$2.71 million plus 1 percent of gross sales. The first New Hampshire McDonald's opened in 1964 on South Willow Street in Manchester, a block from Dick and Mac McDonald's childhood home. The 596<sup>th</sup> franchise opened just around the time Dick retired. Today there are 36,899 McDonalds that serve about 69 million customers every day.

#### THE SIX OLDEST RESTAURANTS IN NEW ENGLAND

The six oldest restaurants in New England include taverns that served hungry travelers and a diner that fed mill workers after their shift. As is always the case with the word 'oldest,' some of our choices are open to debate.

**GRISWOLD INN, ESSEX, CONN.** 26 N. Main St The Griswold Inn, known as 'The Gris,' has been feeding people since it first opened its doors in 1776. It was founded by three brothers, who were not Griswolds, but named it after the **Griswold family** in the area. Only six families have ever run it. The British captured The Gris during the **War of 1812** and used it as a base of operations. It stayed open during **Prohibition**with entertainment for yachtsmen. "We are situated in the historic hamlet of Essex, nestled on the banks of the Connecticut River," reads the **Griswold Inn's website**. "Anyone familiar with Essex knows it as an extraordinary town and The Griswold Inn - a very special place." The dark wood walls and exquisite marine paintings are what you'd expect from a historic inn that catered to sailors since the **American Revolution**.

**PALACE DINER, BIDDEFORD, MAINE** 18 Franklin St. The Pollard Co. built the **Palace Diner** in Lowell, Mass., in 1927. The barrel-roofed car moved to Biddeford, Maine, and has been serving up comfort food ever since. Today it is one of two Pollard cars left in the United States (the other is in Bristol, N.H.), and it's part of the Biddeford Historical District. The Cliff House in Ogunquit is also a contender for oldest restaurant, but it hasn't been continuously operated since it opened in 1862. Greg Mitchell and Chad Conley are the sixth Palace Diner proprietors. They make traditional food with quality ingredients like organic lettuce and Bangs Island mussels. The Palace Diner is open until 2 p.m. serving breakfast and lunch all day seven days a week.

UNION OYSTER HOUSE, BOSTON 41-43 Union St When the Union Oyster House first opened its doors as the Atwood & Bacon Oyster House in 1826, the building was already more than 100 years old. It was likely built in 1704 and first occupied by Hopestill Capen's dress goods business. In 1771, Isaiah Thomas published The Massachusetts Spy from the second floor. (Thomas later decamped to Worcester during the Siege of Boston). Presidential wannabes and an exiled French king patronized the Union Oyster House.

Daniel Webster used to consume six plates of oysters and a tumbler of brandy for lunch at the oyster house, and Sen. John F. Kennedy liked to read his Sunday paper there. The French king Louise Philippe lived in exile on the second floor in 1796. Today the Union Oyster House serves traditional New England fare.

**HANCOCK INN, HANCOCK, N.H.** 33 Main St. The **Hancock Inn** became a favorite of another U.S. president, **Franklin Pierce**, when his friend state Sen. David Patten bought it in 1830. It has been run continuously as an inn since it opened in 1789. The tavern and dining room are especially cozy in the winter, as they're heated by a fireplace and wood-burning stove. The Town of Hancock itself was once partly owned by John Hancock, and today nearly every building on Main Street is on the National Register of Historic Places. A Paul **Revere bell** chimes on the hour from Hancock's meetinghouse.

WHITE HORSE TAVERN, NEWPORT, R.I. 26 Marlborough St The name 'White Horse Tavern' is relatively new, since it was named in 1730, nearly 80 years after Francis Brinley built the first building on the site in 1652. Today the White Horse Tavern is not only a national landmark but the oldest tavern in America. William Mayes bought the property in 1673, added to the building and opened a tavern. It was used as a meeting place for the Rhode Island General Assembly, the court and city hall. Mayes' son William, a pirate, ran the tavern into the 18th century. Loyalists and British troops stayed there during the occupation of Newport and the Battle of Rhode Island. It was used as a boarding house for many years until a benefactor donated money to the Preservation Society of Newport to restore the building. It reopened in 1953 as a tavern and restaurant. The White Horse dining room serves up local seafood and produce to diners who follow its business-casual dress code.

**DORSET INN ON THE GREEN, DORSET, VT.** 8 Church Street & Route 30 The Dorset Inn sits on the spine of the Green Mountains near three ski resorts. Its restaurant started serving food around 1796. The **first chef raised his own chickens, cows and vegetables, and bought milk from the farmer next door.** Today the Dorset Inn serves bistro food with as many local ingredients as possible. Dinner served from 5:30 to 9:30 in the dining room and tavern (the dining room has a business casual dress code). Ye Olde Tavern in nearby Manchester, Vt., opened in 1790 and beat out the Dorset Inn as the oldest restaurant in Vermont. However it lost its liquor license -- and its 'continuously operating' claim -- in 1904, not reopening until 1924.

## The Amazing Amish Cinnamon Bread Alternative (makes 2 loaves)

Amish bread is amazingly good but can take a long time to make. So, this is the quick and just as delicious alternative recipe for anyone that wants their bread fast.

**Ingredients**: 1c butter softened; 2c sugar; 2 eggs; 2 cups buttermilk or 2 cups milk plus 2 tablespoons vinegar or lemon juice 4 cups flour 2 teaspoons baking soda Cinnamon/sugar mixture: 2/3 cups sugar, 2 teaspoons cinnamon

Cream together 1 c butter softened;, 2 cups of sugar, and eggs. Add milk, flour, and baking soda. Put 1/2 of batter (or a little less) into greased loaf pans (1/4 in each pan). Mix in separate bowl the 2/3 c sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle 3/4 of cinnamon mixture on top of the 1/2 batter in each pan(5x9). Add remaining batter to pans; sprinkle with last of cinnamon topping. Swirl with a knife. Bake at 350 degrees for 45-50 min. or until toothpick tester come clean. Cool in pan for 20 minutes before removing from pan.

## **Chocolate Crazy Cake Recipe (No Eggs, Milk, Butter or Bowls)**

CRAZY CAKE, also known as Wacky Cake & Depression Cake - No Eggs, Milk, Butter, Bowls or Mixers! Super moist and delicious. Go to recipe for egg/dairy allergies. Recipe dates back to the Great Depression. It's darn good cake! These cakes were created during the Great Depression, when eggs, milk and butter were very hard to come by. The cakes are also known as Depression Cakes. It took some creativity and baking science to create a cake without eggs or butter.

**Ingredients:** 1 1/2 Cups flour (all-purpose);3 Tbsp. cocoa (unsweetened;1 Cup sugar; 1 tsp. baking soda;1/2 tsp. salt;1 tsp. white vinegar;1 tsp.pure vanilla extract ;5 Tbsp. vegetable oil; 1 Cup water

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Mix first 5 dry ingredients in a greased 8" square baking pan. Make 3 depressions in dry ingredients - two small, one larger Pour vinegar in one depression, vanilla in the other and the vegetable oil in third larger depression. Pour water over all. Mix well until smooth. Bake on middle rack of oven for 35 minutes. Check with toothpick to make sure it comes out clean. Cool. Top with your favorite frosting or just sprinkle confectionery sugar on top.

Note: Oven baking times may vary, be sure to check your cake to make sure you do not over bake.

Sculptured Rocks Natural Area 251 Sculptured Rocks Rd Groton, (10 mi 18 min) Free Sculptured Rocks Natural Area, which spans 272 acres, is a unique example of nature's powerful yet delicate artistry. The Cockermouth River carved a narrow canyon in bedrock on its way to Newfound Lake, beginning as the last ice age drew to a close. Nature used grains of sand suspended in the current to carve the walls of the canyon into curious shapes and create potholes in the bedrock. It is a short walk into the woods from a small parking lot. A bridge spans the little canyon and you can access the creek from many areas.
